The purpose is to portray one view of the suffrage issue to the readers.</p>	<p>The tone sounds like Wilson is encouraging the suffragettes. The purpose may be to tell them to be patient, that this is a huge change.</p>	<p>The flag symbolized Constitutional Rights such as freedom and equality. The purpose of the march is to influence public opinion.</p>

Suffragettes might disagree that it is an "astonishing tide" in history.</p>	<p>Suffragettes would agree with the message. Those opposed to women voting or not supportive of President Wilson might disagree.</p>
